We will be opening for applications for March and May 2018 sittings on Monday September 4th at noon. The March session caters for L and A levels only while the May session caters for all levels. The provisional dates for these sittings are March 3rd in Portlaoise and May 19th in Mullingar.

Application fee must be paid at time of booking (or via cheque immediately) and is non-refundable and non-transferrable to another sitting, so book wisely!

Annual Fees

For those who have not paid their annual distinction fee this year, please note that you are now in arrears and are no longer allowed to use IPF distinction letters after your name.

The annual fee is very reasonable at €25 for standard renewal and only €15 for seniors. These fees help fund everything we do as an organisation so we

Focusing on: Navan Camera Club



Q: When was Navan Camera Club founded?

A: Navan Camera Club was set up in 1987.

Q: How many members do you have?

A: We have an annual membership of between 60 - 70 members.

Q: When and where do you meet?

A: We meet every second Monday between September and May at our premises at Liscarton, Kells Road, Navan.

Q: Any notable events? (exhibitions/workshops etc.)

A: We have an exhibition taking place from 1st - 31st August 2017 in Navan Library celebrating 30 years of our members' work.

Q: When was the club started and by whom?

A: The club was started by a group of ten enthusiasts, following their completion of beginner and intermediate courses in photography, which was held in the VEC (currently Beaufort College, Navan).

Q: Any member have any significant achievements or milestones recently?

A: We have 8 members who have their Licentiate Distinction from the IPF. They are Aaron Smith, Davy Mullen, Denis O' Donovan, Ita Boyle, Aubrey Martin, Andrew Ellis, Maria Brady and most recently Andrew Yeates in 2016. Andrew Yeates also has had some success in FIAP international salons, including over 200 acceptances and a gold medal in The Saoud Al-Thani Award for Photography and is working towards his AFIAP Distinction this year. Members Aubrey Martin and Haydn Hammerton have also had successes in The Top Oil Calendar Competition and An Crann Photo Competition respectively, in the last year.

Q: To what do you attribute your success?

A: The aim of the camera club has always been to promote photography through encouragement and exposure to the work of other photographers (both professional and enthusiast). It is with a great sense of pride that we are still active and growing on this celebration of our 30th anniversary - a testament to the dedication, hard work and never-ending enthusiasm of so many members - past and present.

Q: What was the best outing/talk/club night in last 12 months?

A: We had a fantastic programme last year with many memorable talks, workshops and outings. Highlights include talks and image presentations by Malcolm McCamley and Eimhear Collins on Macro and Seascapes photography respectively. We had an in house workshop run by Andy and Milca at MIAN Photography on Water Splash and Smoke photography using flash, fruit and broken bulbs, which was a great night of fun. Two outings that were well received were a fantastic trip to Dublin Falconry in Balbriggan and the club had a very enjoyable weekend away in Ballincollig, in Cork back in April. Members that didn't go were told "What happened in Cork, stays in Cork".

Q: If another camera club came to your town where are the best kept secrets that they should photograph?

A: Navan is close to a number of great locations for photography, including The Hill of Tara, Bective Abbey, great walkways along the River Boyne are brilliant for wildlife, etc and we are a stones throw away from iconic places like Loughcrew and Trim Castle.

Q: What is the aspect of your group that makes it so special?

A: Coupled with enthusiastic beginners and senior members willing to share their knowledge, and a committee that does a lot of work in the background, we have a very welcoming manner within the club. There is a great social aspect to the club, trying to make it both fun and educational for all there.

Q: If you could ask the IPF to improve on one thing, what would that be?

A: Hard to say at this point as we are working as a club to become more involved with the IPF organised events in the future. We welcome the introduction of the North East Regional Committee and hope to see a lot more workshops and interaction with other clubs too in the coming years. Keep it up.



In the Spotlight: James Cosgrove

James is a Monaghan-based amateur photographer and a co-founding member and Chairperson of Clones Photography Group.



Q: When did you take up photography?

A: I took up photography in early 2013 having just purchased my first DSLR, however, it was not until the following year that the photography bug took hold.

Q: Which club are you a member of?

A: I am a member of Clones Photography Group.

Q: Do you have any IPF/FIAP/RPS etc. distinctions?

A: No, although I am due to sit a Licentiatehip distinction in September. I am also hoping to obtain an AFIAP distinction in early 2018.

Q: First camera? First DSLR?

A: My first DSLR camera was a Nikon D3100 with an 18-55mm kit lens.

Q: What was the background to your most successful image?

A: My most successful image to date in competition is a portrait which I took of my daughter in 2015 which was taken with the IPF National Shield in mind. The theme of my image, which I later entitled "In Silence" was to depict a child suffering in silence. I was finding it quite difficult to achieve the intended look on my daughter's face as my daughter smiles with her eyes, so I fired a few math questions at her just before taking each photo - the look of confusion on her face worked quite well. The image went on to win a Silver medal at the National Shield, along with an honourable mention at the IPF

Photographer of the Year competition in early 2017, followed by a gold medal, two judge's awards, and a number of honourable mentions in international salons.

Q: Your own favourite image?

A: Hopefully the one I take tomorrow.



Q: What genre of photography best describes your photography or are you a general interest photographer?

A: I am primarily a portrait photographer, however, I do dabble in most photographic genres.

Q: Canon or Nikon or Fuji or Sony?

A: Nikon, for the sole reason that I have never used any other DSLR brand and upgrading my camera body in the past has not been a difficult transition.

Q: Would you recommend joining a camera club? Why? What have you got out of it?

A: I think being part of a camera club is essential for any photographer aiming to improve their skill set as having access to workshops and attending guest speaker events on a regular basis has proven invaluable to me. There are also social



benefits to joining a camera club, I have met many new friends which I otherwise would never have had the opportunity to meet.



Q: What does photography mean to you?

A: Photography for me is a great hobby, which has given me much to do and learn in my spare time. It is a constant challenge but a really enjoyable one and can be very rewarding whether it is in a competitive environment or whether it is simply to have an image hang proudly on a wall.

Peoples Photography Exhibition 2017



Every year in August The Peoples Photography Exhibition is held on the railings of St. Stephens Green and for the last number of years the IPF has exhibited at it and this year is no exception. It's a great time to see what the IPF does for

photography in Ireland and meet and discuss photography with members of the Council.

The People's Photography Exhibition is a unique opportunity to enjoy a showcase of striking images in a relaxed atmosphere in the heart of Dublin city. This Summer's event features a diverse selection of work from enthusiasts, clubs and international award-winning professionals. Themes on display include landscape, monochrome, photojournalism, portraiture, creative, nature, analogue, digital and abstract.


This exhibition is the ideal option to do something different at the weekend and what's even better, it benefits good causes.

The exhibition, held each August for the last 30 years, is a significant national affair and has become the largest outdoor photographic exhibition in Ireland in terms of both the number of photographers involved and the number of works on view. The event is run on a non-profit making basis. After expenses are paid, donations are made to charity. Past donations have been made to the Dublin Simon Community and the National Council for the Blind of Ireland. Combined totals of more than €8,000 has been donated to each organisation from the proceeds of the exhibition over the last number of years.

The exhibition opening times are as follows: Mon - Wed 10am-6pm, Thur - Fri 10am- 9pm, Sat 10am-6pm, Sun 12am-5pm. The exhibition will take place in the unit beside Quigley's, located in the Workhouse Square event space. The exhibition will be officially launched by The Irish Photographic Federation's newly elected President Dominic Reddin on Friday the 11th of August at 7.00pm. Light refreshments will be served and our annual Photographer Of The Year competition [POTY] award ceremony will also take place.

This years exhibition will see 56 members of all ages and levels of ability participating. The exhibition reflects the hard work and dedication of the society members and we are delighted that many of our new members who have joined this year are featuring for the first time in our annual Exhibition. When Kevin decided to call it a day in New York City he came to Ireland and settled for about 9 years in Kilkenny where he wanted to pursue his career as Photographic artist, specialising in magnificent panoramic Landscape Photographs of Ireland. As well as Kilkenny he lived in Clonakilty and Donegal.

During the 34th Annual Exhibition we will show a small selection of his photographic talents from college work, advertising work along with some of his splendid panoramic photos , donated to this years exhibition by some of his friends here in Kilkenny. Kevin A Logan passed away this year and will be sadly missed by everyone that was lucky to have known him.
