One can't go for a loaf of bread right now without facing a barrage of festive music, coloured lights and all kinds of seasonal food adverts. As photographers, I think we tend to neglect this time of year. All of us have family and friends, and this means that this time of year there is a high premium on every minute of our time. The minute we turn our backs, somebody is arranging something to commit us to and consume the last of our already tight schedules. I think this is a shame. There are plenty of opportunities to be had. My advice is to pack a small camera bag now, and take it with you everywhere you go. This is the unchanging advice every time of year I know, but it's even more valuable at this time of year. Other times of the year we may be getting enough shooting done within our chosen fields or preferred genres. This time of year we tend to leave our cameras on the shelf. I mean - there's nothing new to shoot this time of year, right? I mean - who wants to see another lit shopping street? Who wants to see another Christmas tree, or Family dinner photo? None of that will ever get me my coveted IPF gold medal, right?

Wrong! Some of the most unique images ever created have happened when someone applies a new approach to a well-worn subject. Fresh photography and ground-breaking imagery is probably more about YOU as a photographer and artist than it is about your subject! Always remember that. Never give yourself the "excuse" that you have nothing "new" to shoot, so therefore you can't produce "new" work. Get out there, with fresh eyes, and come back with fresh images. At the very least, shooting more will keep you sharp. And you know what? In years to come, when some of our closest, nearest and dearest have passed on, which photos will we value the most? We will always be proud of our creative successes. The great pictorial images, the abstracts, the nature shots, the travel shots that mean so much to us, and maybe brought us some success in exhibition or competition. These are great nuggets of ourselves we leave behind, and they have huge value, but even these will be surpassed. The images we will cherish, and value the most in years to come, will be those we took of the people who mean the most to us, who looked out for us, nurtured us, celebrated with us and struggled with us. The Christmas (or alternative) season is an opportunity that brings all of these people together. And we can never know which one will be our last opportunity ...

I will leave you with a quote from Jay Maisel...

"If you are out there shooting, things will happen for you. If you're not out there, you'll only hear about it...!"

Dear fellow photographer,

Sunday 21st November witnessed the beginning of the season for the regional rounds of the IPF Photographer of the Year Competition. The action was at the Horse and Jockey Hotel in Tipperary for the SACC qualifying event. Well done to everyone who participated and a particular word of gratitude to the SACC for their familiar sleek efficiency in making this gathering the success that it is.

Behind all this annual cycle of regional and national events are sets of regional organisers and a national team from the IPF. We just don't suddenly appear around now and fade away after the national finals. This is a year round exercise from selecting domestic and international judges, fine tuning the rule book, software support, liaising with sponsors, through to transporting and processing the qualifying prints before the final.

We've already seen with the SACC how more streamlined the event is with the new digital submission of all images including the prints. Also the introduction of a colour coded labelling should make further processing of the prints a lot easier.

Yet again, please make yourself familiar with the rules of both competitions. Pay special attention to the following:

- A digital copy of ALL entries including prints must be uploaded at the time of online entry

As with the Photographer of the Year Competition above, please pay particular attention to the following major announcements regarding this competition -

- The competition is open to all individual photographers who are paid up members of currently affiliated photographic clubs or societies
- This year we are introducing a uniform and mandatory labelling system for all print entries. These labels will be colour coded as per your region and available from IPF website
- Please take a very careful look at the definitions of Advanced and Non Advanced entry criteria. Entry into the incorrect category can cause administrative mayhem!
- A digital copy of ALL entries including prints must be uploaded at the time of online entry
- As you can see we have introduced a new rule under Section 5.7 relating to distress caused to any creature in the course of taking an image. Please observe carefully and respect all creatures you photograph.

These regional events are great social occasions too, so I'm looking forward to meeting many of you in the coming weeks and especially at the finals in Kilkenny on Feb 20th and 21st.

Focusing on: Athlone Photography Club



Q: When was Athlone Photography club founded?

A: The club was founded in September 2013.

Q: How many members do you have?

A: Numbers have been growing strongly since the foundation of the club and we currently have 43 paid members for this season.

Q: When and where do you meet?

A: We meet every second Wednesday at Abbey Road Studios, Abbey Road, Athlone between 19.30 and 21.30, although the meetings usually last until much later.

Q: Any notable events?

A: For the past two years, the club has been involved in the RTE All-Ireland Drama Fringe Festival. Every year in April, the drama festival organises events in Athlone and the club has been exhibiting themed images for the duration of the event. For the first year, APC exhibited landscape images of Athlone and its surroundings and last year, we put together a series of environmental portraiture of local peoples such as shopkeeper and other art related groups. The exhibition takes place in the Athlone Town Centre.

Q: Any members have any significant achievements or milestones recently?

A: Since its creation, APC has been gathering a number of individual awards. Two members were fortunate to represent Ireland at international level. Liam Kidney had one image which was included as part of the Projected Panel at the Celtic Challenge 2015. Anthony Demion was selected to represent the country at the 28th FIAP Projected Image Competition which was held in Indonesia. He was also chosen as part of the "Aternum Fotoamatori Abruzzi" in Italy.

Liam Kidney also obtained an Honourable Mention at the National Club Finals 2014.

Alan Hunt was awarded two IPF Medals over the last two PPI competitions.

Last but not least, Girtó Miko, Lina Gorodeckaite Bechara and Paul Grogan managed individual recognitions at the recent National Shield claiming two IPF Gold Medals (Girtó in the colour category, Lina in the Mono category) a bronze medal (Paul in the Mono section) and an Honourable Mention (Girtó in the Mono section).

The club currently have seven members who have LIPF distinctions (Ann Dwyer, Lise Helberg, Aine Connaughton, Helen Maloney, Paul Doran, Anthony Demion and Henry Yee), many of them

already started work on their Associateship Panel.

Q: What do you attribute your success at the National Shield to?

A: There's a few things. Club members will organise events and trips, some great images always come out of these. A selection committee with a broad range of tastes and personalities is put together. But mostly it's down to the club members, almost everybody that was entitled to entered images for consideration. That meant there was a lot of options and a lot of strong images that made selection difficult.

Q: What was your selection process?

A: Initially, as a selection group, we studied the images on our own and got familiar with all the images. We then identified each person's best three or four images, and brought that subset of images into our final panel selection meeting. The obvious ones picked themselves, but we debated and voted on the remaining places. The image with the most convincing argument won through. That sounds like it was quite a short process, but it was anything but. Everyone involved put in a lot of effort.

Q: Any suggestions to other clubs for next year's National Shield?

A: Get out on group photo shoots, be it a day trip, an evening session, or a planned themed shoot. Simply just get out with your camera. Share your knowledge to help the person beside you; and help yourself improve by soaking up any information, techniques, ways of seeing from those around you.

Q: What was the best outing / talk / club night in the last 12 months?

A: The club welcomed three guest speakers last year and all were very well received by the audience. George Karbus gave a captivating insight in his wildlife, landscape and underwater photography which took everyone's breath away. Seamus Costelloe visited us with all his prints and talk about his portraiture work and we all enjoyed listening to his work and finally we had the chance to have Dina Douglass, Los Angeles based wedding and High Fashion photographer, drop by Athlone while on her European Tour to present her work and perform a demonstration. All were very different yet extremely entertaining. Finally, the club organised a weekend trip to Connemara and also set up a Halloween theme photoshoot which were both fun, entertaining and resulted in creating a lot of stand-out images.

Q: If another camera club came to Athlone, where are the best kept secrets that they should photograph?

A: It's not a secret but Saint Peter and Paul Cathedral along with the Luan Gallery is a crowd favourite for anyone with an interest in Architecture photography. Being on the shore of Lough Ree, there are many locations which can provide a lovely scene for a sunset image such as Glassan, Rindoon or Portlick Castle and woods. The forest of Mote Park outside Roscommon is a great location to capture the Autumnal colours and less than an hour's drive the Lough Boora Parkland is a club members' pleaser.

Q: What is the aspect of your group that makes it so special?

A: We believe that our club is there to promote photography in a fun and friendly environment. We tend to learn from another by sharing our knowledge amongst the group. Generally, a member with a field of interest would present what she or he does in the view of providing some knowledge that another member may not yet possess. This has proved to be a successful method so far.

Q: If you could ask the IPF to improve on one thing, what would that be?

A: Athlone Photography Club is part of the Mid-West region. This is probably one of the smallest region in the IPF and does not possess as yet the structure that the DSLR or SACC have. It would be a great idea to try and promote a similar pattern if the interest of the various clubs who belong to this region is there to see it grow stronger. It is something APC would relish the possibility to be involved in.

FIAP Update

Closing Date

As previously announced, the closing date for Irish applications for FIAP distinctions has moved to February 28th this year as increasing demand for this service requires a longer timeframe for processing applications. Anyone considering applying for a distinction should contact FIAP Liaison Officer Paul Stanley via the IPF site to confirm their intentions and receive instructions.



MFIAP Applications

Effective immediately, MFIAP applications are also being processed.

The applicant must have held the EFIAP for a minimum of 3 years. The application is by means of 20 prints (with accompanying jpg images). In addition the application must complete a photographic CV or Resume and submit an introductory text describing the subject and the creative concept of the photographer. This distinction, the Master level, is awarded to a very small amount of photographers worldwide each year and we hope that more Irish names will soon be added to that list!

Please be aware that the closing date for MFIAP applications is **December 31st 2015**. Anyone who is considering applying for an MFIAP must do so via our FIAP Liaison Officer Paul and should contact him immediately.

To constitute a portfolio the prints must be linked, and must be a coherent and harmonious whole, both in respect of the contents of the images and vision of the author, and in respect of their size and presentation. The choice of idea behind the portfolio is left entirely to the initiative of the applicant, who has the largest possible freedom of expression. The portfolio can be built on a theme, be a sequence; or the illustration of a story. These are examples but not an exhaustive list. This award is by no means automatic and, unlike all those above, the criteria are much more subjective. Applications are considered by the members of the FIAP Directory Board and are awarded on a simple majority vote of those members. If the award is not made the candidate receives a written explanation for the rejection.

Club Affiliation Fees for 2016

Our Treasurer Brian sends us the following note regarding annual fees for 2016. Please ensure your club treasurer is aware.

"For a Club to be affiliated to the IPF they must pay an annual Affiliation Fee. Please note that regardless of when a club pays this fee, the affiliation year runs from 1st January to 31st December. Only affiliated clubs may enter IPF competitions and members of affiliated clubs can apply for distinctions at the preferential rate, which offers a 50% reduction on the distinction application fee.

The Affiliation Fee is €75 for clubs with less than 50 members and €100 for clubs with 50 members or more.

All clubs must complete the online form when making the payment as this allows the IPF to maintain up-to-date information on club contacts. Your yearly application is not complete until this form is completed. You may pay

via Paypal directly from this form, or indicate on the form that you will be paying by cheque. For ease of administration, Paypal is preferred.

Each club is also obliged to provide a copy of its current public liability insurance cover. There is a space on the online form to upload a digital copy of this (or you may send a paper copy).

New clubs must also lodge a copy of their constitution with us.

The facility for clubs to pay the 2016 Affiliation Fees will be made available on the IPF website from 1st December 2015 and payment should be made before the 31st January 2016.

For SACC clubs, please note that the same process and same form applies, but payment & information is collected via the SACC website instead.

In the Spotlight: John Finn

Q: When did you take up photography?

A: In the 1970s.

Q: What persuaded you to take up photography?

A: To capture some of the wonderful variety of the world around me, or at least to attempt it.



Q: Which club are you a member of?

A: Cork Camera Group

Q: Do you have any IPF / FIAP / RPS etc distinctions?

A: LIPF, ARPS.

Q: Can you tell us about your relationship with photography - when did it start?

A: My first exposure to serious amateur photography was in 1973 at the (long since defunct) Cork Camera Club - not to be confused with the Cork Camera Group! A work colleague was President and he invited me along to a meeting. It was the first time I saw Kodachrome slides projected and the quality - the sharpness, the colour saturation - blew me away. I immediately made plans to buy a camera that could deliver such quality. When I did, I joined the Cork Photo Workshop, a breakaway from what was regarded as the old fogeys and stale attitudes of the rather staid Cork Camera Club. It was there I learned my craft.

Q: What was the background to your most successful image?

A: If I can chose images plural then it would have to be my 15 photo ARPS panel. It was comprised of a series of inverted reflections in the River Lee, Cork City. It got the unanimous approval of the RPS judges. It was shot with a 5/5/5 presentation configuration in mind and so I have not put it forward for

an IPF distinction as such a configuration is not catered for by the IPF and it would not work in any other arrangement.



Q: First camera? First DSLR?

A: A Nikkormat FTn - a consumer version of the professional grade Nikon F - was my first film SLR, purchased in Vic Odden's in London in 1973. My first DSLR was a Canon 20D.

Q: Are there photographers you are influenced by?

A: I like the architectural work of Joel Tjintjelaar and Julia Anna Gospodaro. In landscape, I like Charlie Waite and Gary McParland. My all time favourite photographer is Elliott Erwitt - I love the humour in his work

Q: Your own favourite image?

A: My 7-year-old granddaughter aged 1 day. I have a huge canvas print of it hanging on a wall. I expect she will be showing it to her own grandchildren when she is a very old lady.



Q: What genre of photography best describes your photography or are you a general interest photographer?

A: General interest with a leaning towards landscape and architectural and latterly, influenced by my friend Bill Power FIPF, model photography - what might be described as "fine art nudes" but I would never use the term "fine art" for any of my work as I have an irrational loathing of the term.

Q: Canon or Nikon or Fuji or Sony ?

A: Canon DSLRs and a Sony RX100 compact (with which I photographed my successful ARPS panel) .

Q: Would you recommend joining a camera club? Why? What have you got out of it?

A: Absolutely. A good club helps with motivation and with raising one's own standard of photography. I certainly have experienced that in the CCG not to mention the assistance and advice from fellow members. And of course there is the social aspect. I had been out of the club scene for years but I'm glad I returned.

Q: What does photography mean to you?

A: If I can be a bit pretentious, it's a form of artistic expression. I find that to do serious,

personal photography I have to be "in the zone", a state of mind where there is total focus and heightened attention to detail and in turn that can result in serendipitous moments where all the elements come together and an exceptional image is created. It is almost a meditative state.

Q: What is your photographic dream?

A: Ideally, it would be to develop a signature style, to do something different to the clichéd, boring old stuff that I still turn out.

Top Tips for Perfect Bird Photography - Kevin Murphy FIPF ARPS

Kevin Murphy, one of Ireland's finest nature photographers, concludes his fine series of articles regarding bird photography in this edition. We hope you enjoyed reading his tips and admiring his stunning images. Kevin holds a Fellowship with ourselves and an Associateship with the Royal Photographic Society. Thank you Kevin!

In my previous articles, I talked about the challenges of photographing fast moving birds. You need to get close, shoot fast and you need to be very familiar with your camera settings. In this article I'll give some tips on how to practice and improve your photography skills in your own back garden. All you need is a feeder and lots of nuts!

The trick is to position your camera close to a bird feeder. I shoot through an open window with the feeder 3 metres away. Set up the feeder close to the house, leave it for a few days, keeping it topped up, and let the birds get familiar with the new location. I regularly get 10 different species visiting mine, often on the same day, so there is plenty of variety and colour to choose from.

Attach a freshly cut twig to a spare tripod and place it 2 metres from the feeder, at the same height. The birds will use this as a staging post before moving on to the feeder. Set up the camera on a tripod, slightly higher than the feeder, angled slightly downwards.

Perching Birds

To get a sharp picture of perching birds you will need a shutter speed of 1/300th to 1/500th of a second. For this type of shoot I usually use Aperture Priority with a low setting of f/5.6 - f/6.3 and adjust the ISO to give me the required shutter speed. The ISO setting is dependent on the available light, but on a sunny day it should be around 500 - 800. Use as low an ISO setting as you can, to achieve the required shutter speed. Take a few test shots of the twig and check the histogram to make sure the exposure settings are correct and adjust, using the exposure compensation dial, if required. Check that the lawn in the background is out of focus and blemish free. Remember to focus on the bird's eyes and take plenty of shots.

Birds in Flight

After you have mastered the technique of taking pictures of perching birds you can attempt to capture them in flight. This is not as easy as it sounds. Their small size and fast flight makes focusing extremely difficult and bear in mind that the wings are beating at up to 20 times per second.

The plan is to capture the birds in flight, between the twig and the feeder. We have set up a predictable pathway, where we know they will fly to and from. They will stop off at the staging post then head to the feeder, when there is an available landing slot. The flight time will take about 1/5th of a second.

You will need a shutter speed of at least 1/4000th of a second to totally freeze the wing beats. The best way to achieve this is with high speed flash. I use a Canon 580EX Speedlite (off camera) and set it to the High Speed Sync function. Set the camera to Manual, shutter speed 1/4000th, aperture f/5.6, ISO 1000. Take a few test shots of the feeder and check the histogram to make sure the exposure settings are correct and adjust the flash output if required. Set the lens to manual focus - the birds will be flying faster than the camera autofocus (or you) can react. Set the focal point of the lens on the bird feeder and fire the shutter using a remote switch.

Now, we are all set! When you see a bird on the twig positioning itself to take off, hit the shutter button on the remote switch. Don't even look through the viewfinder - keep your eye on the bird on the twig and shoot as soon as it

makes a move. It all happens so fast that, in many of the images, the bird will be sitting on the bird feeder eating nuts. But, when you get into the rhythm of it, you will get some fantastic shots showing the intricate detail of those majestic wings.

This month, we are delighted to welcome John Duncan, editor of Source, a photography magazine based in Belfast and share with you a very special offer for readers of our newsletter!

Source is a photography magazine based in Belfast with a remit for photography being produced across Ireland and the United Kingdom. The magazine is funded by the Arts Council and the Arts Council of Northern Ireland. John Duncan has been one of the editors since 1994 and we spoke to him to find out a little more about Source. And to let you know about how to get 16 back issues and the current issue for free in a special offer to all IPF members.

Q: When did Source magazine start?

A: Source was set up in 1992 by a group of photographers who wanted to create more opportunities for photographers to have their work seen. Over the years Source gradually grew from its original 8 page A4 black and white format increasing in page numbers, changing format, printing in colour and regularly updating its design.

The content of the early issues of the magazine included news, reviews, features and portfolios of individual photographers. These have remained a mainstay but as the magazine has increased to its current 80 page count they have increased in number along with new sections covering photo book publishing and specialist columns on photography and the law and a regular column analyzing advertising imagery.

Q: What is your mission / magazine concept?

A: Source is based in Belfast but our remit is to publish the most interesting work being produced across Ireland and the UK. We also connect to what's going on internationally through our book review section. And of course a lot of the exhibitions we review have work in them by international photographers.

We have a small editorial staff, myself and my co editor Richard West, so it's quite a lot to keep an eye on. We try to bring our readers the most interesting material we can find. After twenty years in the job I have looked at a lot of photographs so I hope I can spot what is interesting, and what is new either in terms of subject matter or the approach taken by the photographer. In each issue we feature three photographers work. We work on an edit of images with the photographer and we run 8 to 10 images one per page. So it's a good way to present photographs to readers. And the focus is always on photographer's personal projects. The work that wouldn't maybe otherwise get seen. The sets of images tend to focus on one idea or theme and it's usually something the photographer has been working way on for quite a while.

Q: Who are your audience?

A: Most of the colleges and the Universities who offer degrees in photography, over 150 subscribe so one group is definitely students. From the feedback we get a lot of our readers are photographers. And it's probably photographers who are working towards personal exhibitions or book projects. But we know most people don't make a living from that so many of those photographers are also doing a variety of paid photographic work.

Q: How has your readership grown since you started?

A: Our remit has grown from Northern Ireland to all Ireland to UK and Ireland since 1992. And with that have come readers across that geography. We also have a smaller international distribution and readers. But that's for the printed magazine. Source is a cross platform publisher so we also have the magazine as a digital edition, that's a new opportunity for more international readers.

And then there is our web site www.source.ie its has over 1000 pages of free

content and the readership there is a great mix of national and international readers. We have also grown our followers on Social Media with 29,000 twitter followers. And nearly 10,000 on facebook. We also have our free enewsletter which you can signup to on the website. And we make short films to go with some issues of the magazine which we distribute via our website and Youtube. So it's a mixture of print and digital readers. I still prefer the printed page myself.

Q: Who can submit to your magazine?

A: In each issue we advertise for submissions. Its open to anyone and we don't set a theme. We are interested in people's personal projects and that's usually as set of 8-10 images around one idea. We have published a wide range of photographers work including landscape, portraiture and documentary. The artists section of our website http://www.source.ie/artists/artists_main_index.php is the best place to get a flavour of what we do. We can't consider your work if we haven't seen it so its always worth sending material. You can see how to here <http://www.source.ie/main/submissions.html> its via email. I look at all the work that comes in so it's a good way to introduce your work to us. We also regularly run days for photographers to come and show us work directly which are advertised in the magazine. That's a great way to get some free feedback and pitch us work for publication.

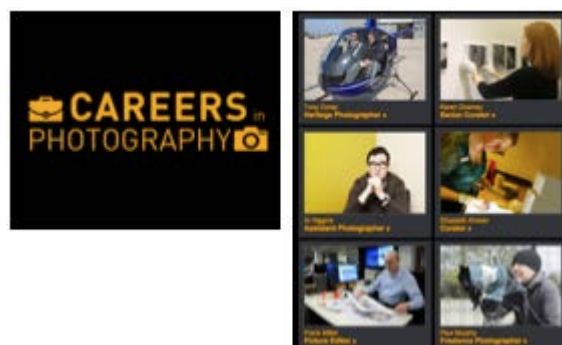


Q: What are our plans for your website Source.ie?

A: We have been developing a number of areas of the site. We are in contact with a lot of teachers so we have some online resources for those getting started in photography. 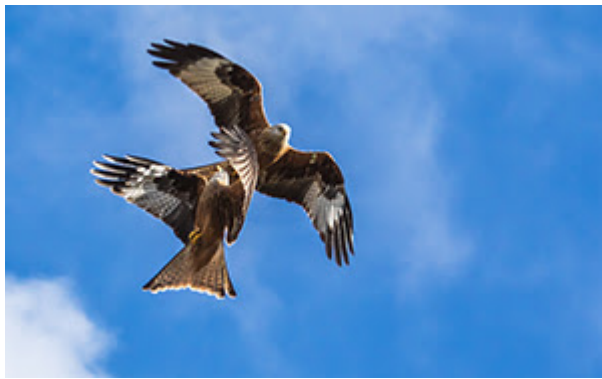

IPF Nature Group Update

The Nature Group has been up and running now for the last year and we would like to take this opportunity through the Newsletter to let you know how the group has fared during this time. As well as organising field trips and workshops we keep our members informed, through our Facebook page, of any interesting sightings of suitable subjects for photography and any Nature related talks and lectures.



We had a good start to the year with an illustrated talk given in Belfast by one of the world's top bird photographers, Jari Peltomaki, called "Wild Finland". This was attended by some Nature Group members even though it was mid week in Belfast. It was certainly the best illustrated talk I have seen with truly amazing photographs of Finland's wildlife.

This was followed in early March with a four day trip to Caerlaverock in Scotland. Caerlaverock is a Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust Reserve and we were able to book accommodation on the reserve itself. We were in luck with the weather (wall to wall sunshine) and had no difficulty in photographing our target species - Whooper Swans, Goosander, and Red Kite. Memory cards filled rapidly and to finish a really good trip an American duck (Blue Winged Teal) put in an appearance and it too was easily photographed.

Blustery weather in early May took the group to the Burren in search of insects and flora, with the welcome assistance of Gerry Butler from Shannon CC, whose local knowledge led us to some really good new locations. Again luck was with us as the flora was in perfect condition for photography and all the rareities in flower in spring were located and photographed. Insects were not quite as good as the Spring weather was a little cooler than usual. However, we did manage to photograph Brimstone, Wood White and Dingy

In conjunction with the Dublin and South Leinster Region we ran a Focus Stacking and Macro workshop in June in Palmerston Community Hall. This was fully booked at an early stage and all participants learned a great deal and, more importantly, enjoyed themselves. The tutors for the workshop

were Mica Gabb Photography.

September saw us join with the NIPA Nature Group for a joint venture. We were to go Dolphin watching in the Shannon estuary but the weather did not favour us this time and we were forced to cancel the outing. As the ten strong NIPA group had already travelled we had a day on Loop Head and dinner together that evening. It is intended to run another joint trip next year.

In October Myles Carroll advertised a whale watching trip out of Youghal on our Facebook page. This was quickly booked out and on the 16th October we assembled at the pier in Youghal. The weather was rather dull for any good photography but the trip went ahead. The Whales performed and did their best to give us a great show. Fin Whales and Humpbacks in good numbers together with lots of Common Dolphins made for a memorable trip.





We had a really good end to our season with Bill Power organising an outdoor workshop, Autumn Woodland and Toadstools. Again this was rapidly booked out and a lot of very positive feedback was received from those who took part. If anyone thought photographing Fungi was easy I think they found out on the day this was definitely not the case.

We are now at the early stages of organising a programme for next year. We would hope, weather permitting, to organise some outdoor workshops followed by a review and critique of what we photographed. Field trips will also be organised according to the season and If members have any ideas we would love to hear from you.

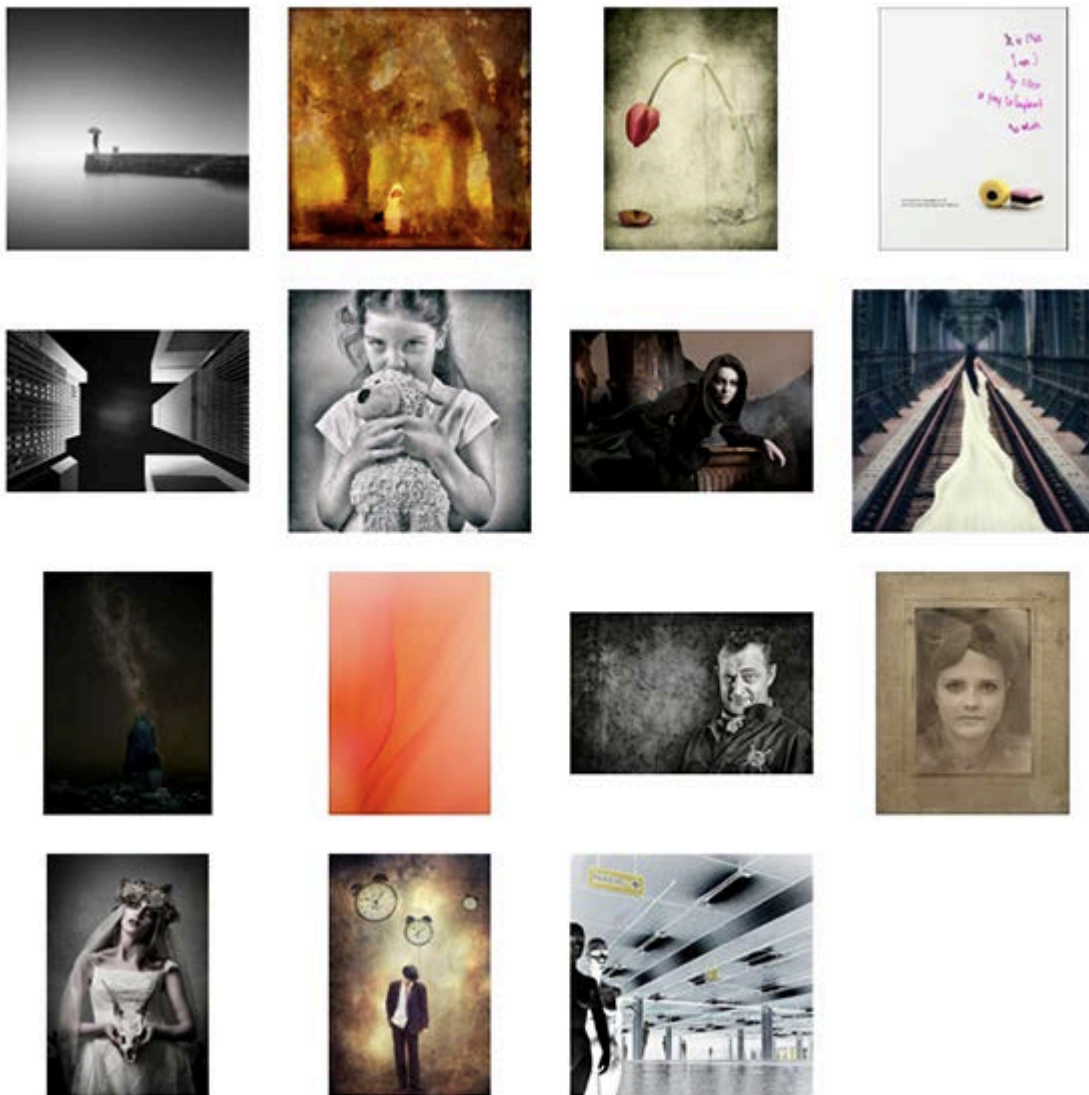

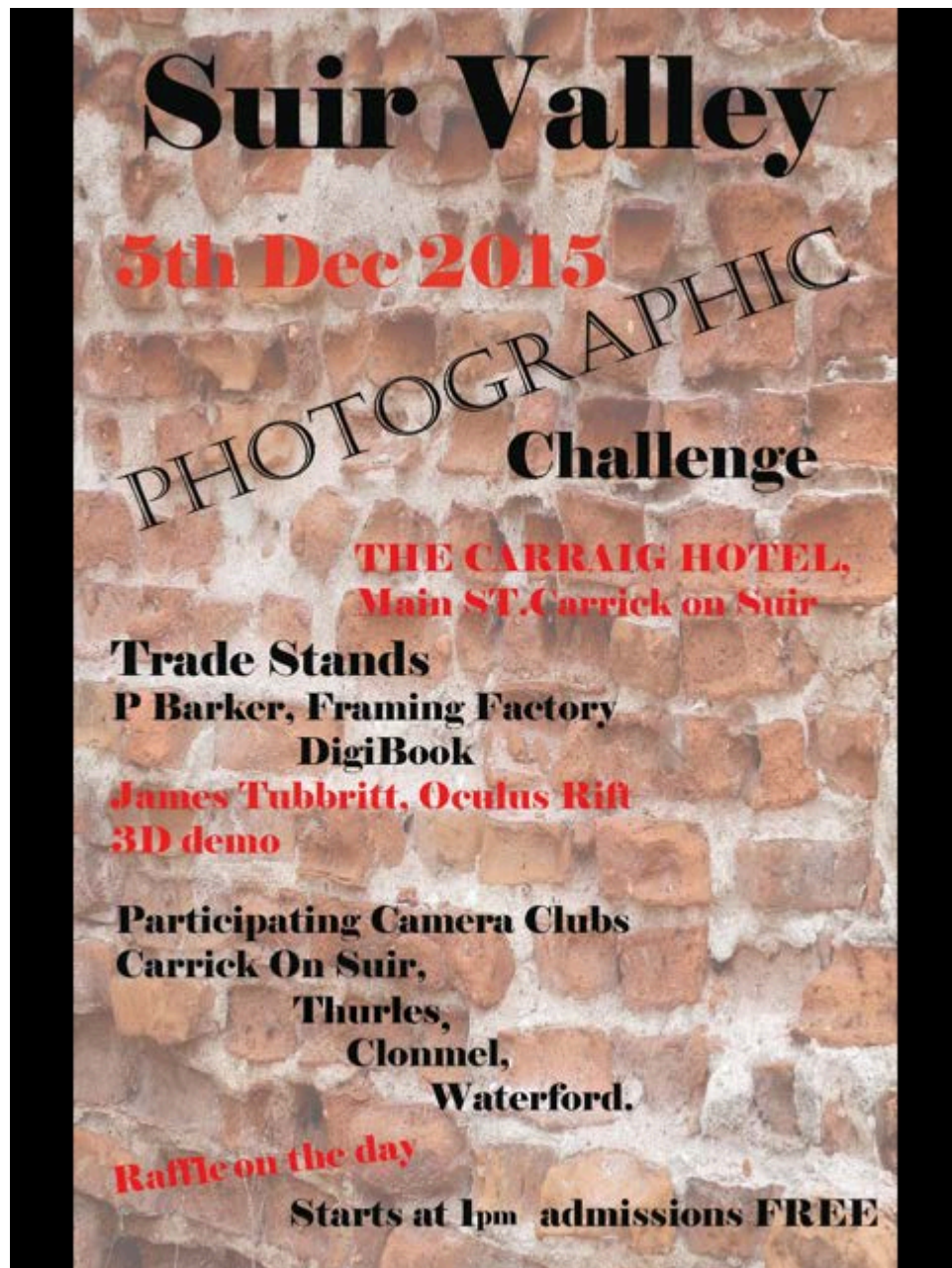
Are you seeking opportunities to attend high quality sporting events and be willing to give up a few hours of your time voluntary?

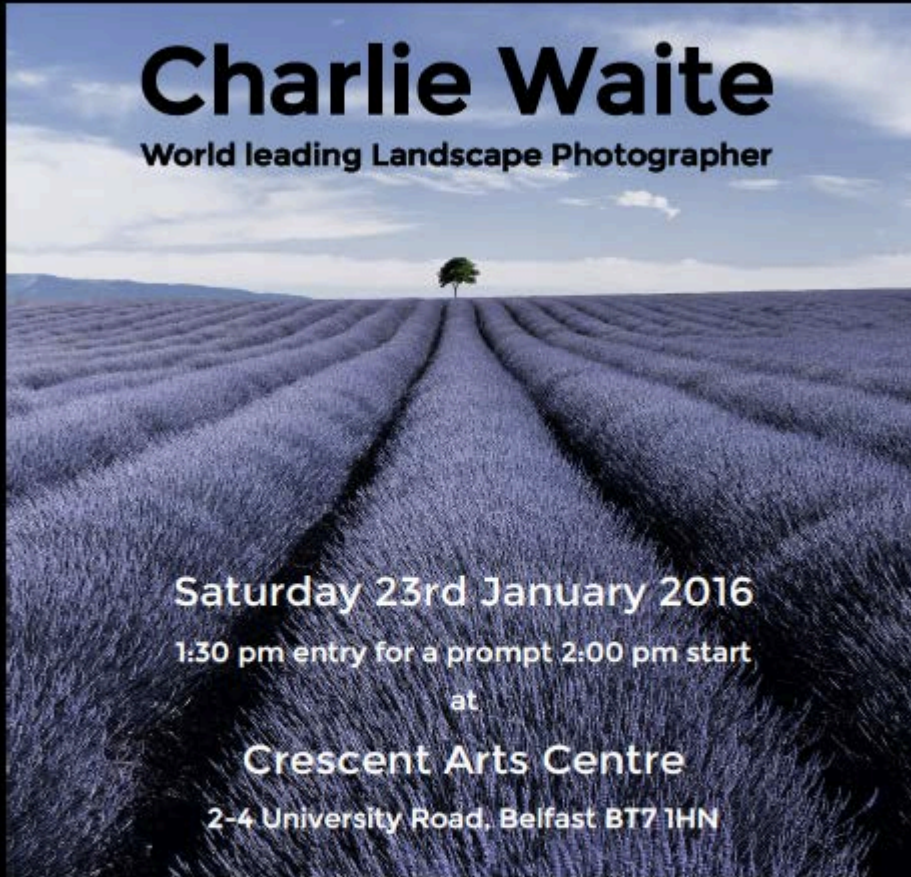
