Images of Distinction - Volume Two Deadline Extended

We've extended the deadline for distinction holders to participate in "Images of Distinction - Volume Two" DVD until the end of March. We are once again asking all our paid up distinction holders to each contribute one image to the DVD. Volume One contained a wonderful set of images that showcased the best of Irish photography. FIAP Distinctions

Note: Deadline for submission of FIAP distinctions this year is March 31st!

Some people who are taking part in FIAP salons and who are aspiring towards FIAP distinctions may have heard of a change to the FIAP requirements. These changes have been posted on the IPF website under the [FIAP FAQs section](#).

These new rules for FIAP Distinctions have caused concern for some of us. Amongst exhibitors the main complaint is about the criteria for EFIAP Levels Distinctions. These changes were brought in for the very best of reasons and, whilst there are problems with the manner of their introduction, I would suggest that they are not nearly as bad as might at first appear. There is also another change which may have been missed by many.

As from 2016 the 'clean break' requirement between EFIAP and EFAIAP levels is gone. This means that an applicant for any EFIAP levels distinction receives an additional 250 acceptances from an additional 50 titles. Therefore if you hold EFAIAP and wish to work towards EFAIAP Bronze, whereas the old target was 75 acceptances from 25 titles, your new target is a maximum of 150 acceptances from 50 new titles, not 400 acceptances from 100 titles, which may be what it appears from a first reading of the new requirements. Also remember that awards from AFIAP and EFAIAP stages might be available also.

The problem lies with the higher levels because the benefit of the AFIAP and EFAIAP results reduces rapidly the further up the scale you go in one particular respect. To give the most extreme example the new rules require the holder of EFAIAP Gold gained in 2016 or later to acquire 500 acceptances from 100 titles. But if you already hold EFAIAP Gold gained in 2015 or before you could need up to 950 acceptances from 250 titles (even with the addition of the



AFIAP and EFIAP results). There is a need for transitional arrangements as this especially affects longstanding and loyal FIAP exhibitors.

Many salons and exhibitors are also concerned about the new 10% rule, whereby only that percentage of the total acceptances required can come from any one country. Again the rule is extremely well intentioned, but is likely to have unforeseen and unwelcome consequences.

The IPF together with the PAGB, the Welsh Federation, the Scottish Federation and the New Zealand Federation have made a joint submission to FIAP asking them to introduce transitional arrangements for EFIAP Levels and a variation in the 10% rule.

I am aware that the new distinctions rules are high on the agenda of the next FIAP Directory Board Meeting and am fairly confident that there will be changes to them, although firstly I do not know what they will be or how successful our submission will be, and secondly the details may not be known until at least April this year.

I will keep you all posted on developments and changes as they come about

- Author Name
- Author Club
- Image Title

Full rules will be available shortly along with the online entry system.

- Chris Palmer FRPS EFIAP DPAGB APAGB
- Margaret Salisbury FRPS, FIPF, MFIAP, APAGB.

There will be a dinner on Saturday night in the Annebrook House Hotel. Dinner will cost €25 per person. Further details of the dinner will be available when the full programme is published on the website.

For accommodation, we will be using the Annebrook House Hotel, their room rates are €119 for a double room in the main hotel and €75 for single occupancy in a hotel room.

The hotel also has a number of 2 bedroom apartments that are €65 per person including breakfast.





Focusing on: Tallaght Photographic Society

Q: When was Tallaght Photographic Society founded?

A: 1974.

I don't know who everyone in the photo is, but the man on the far left is Sean Burke and the man in the centre with the beard and glasses is Harry Coyle - both founding members of the club.

Q: When and where do you meet?

A: We meet each Tuesday from 8pm at the Maldron Hotel, Tallaght.

Q: Any notable events?

A: We host the Tallaght Photographic Society International Salon of Photographic Art. The Salon is now in its 25th year and is open for entries. Last September, we celebrated 40 years of the Tallaght Photographic Society

Q: Any member had any significant achievement or milestones recently?

A: Our member John Byrne recently was awarded the Brendan Walkin Memorial Award by the IPF for his contribution to Irish photography. John has been Chairman of the Tallaght Salon for the last 16 years. The Salon has attracted entries from all over the world, promoting Irish photography at an international level.

Q: What was the best outing/talk/club night in last 12 months?

A: We had a very memorable and entertaining talk by IPF President Michael O'Sullivan sharing not only his fabulous images, but his passion for mythology and knowledge of art history.

Q: If another camera club came to Tallaght, where are the best kept secrets that they should photograph?

A: While Tallaght itself has much to offer for photographers like local parks and some historical sites, the beauty of Tallaght is that within half an hour's journey, you could be either in Dublin city centre, at the sea or in the beautiful Wicklow Mountains. It's a great location for photography.

Q: If you could ask the IPF to improve on one thing, what would that be?
A: I'm happy with the IPF as it is currently - keep up the good work ☺

In the Spotlight: Michael Linehan AIPF

Q: When did you take up photography?

A: About 15 years ago.

Q: What persuaded you to take up photography?

A: My main motivation was to take better family and holiday photographs. I could never take a photograph of a place we visited looked as impressive as it did in real life.



Q: Which club are you a member of?

A: Celbridge Camera Club (this is my 9th year in the club).

Q: Do you have any IPF / FIAP / RPS etc distinctions?

A: LIPF and AIPF

Q: Can you tell us about your relationship with photography - when did it start? First camera? First DSLR?

A: About 15 years ago I borrowed my brother's SLR camera and got some photographs of my children that I liked. After seeing the photographs my wife allowed me to buy a Canon EOS 33 film camera and I took an evening class. Doing the homework was my favourite part as it got me out taking photographs related to that week's lesson which were then critiqued in the following class.

I bought my first DSLR several years later (a Canon EOS 20D) - I think shortly after I had joined Celbridge Camera Club.

Q: What was the background to your most successful image?

A: I've been taking photographs along the canal for several years and herons are a common subject. On this particular dull and rainy day I was driving along the canal and spotted the heron at the lock gate. I pulled in and got out my camera, and almost immediately the heron dived into the water and emerged with the pike. There were some people walking a dog coming towards me so I moved in a bit closer and managed to get a few photos before the heron flew to the other side of the canal.

Once there, he proceeded to swallow that fish and then catch another pike just a few minutes later. The pike did not put up any struggle so I think that the heron had killed it instantly. Its beak had speared the pike through the top of the head (hence the title of the image) and its eyes look lifeless in the photo. So, a lucky day for me. I didn't have to wait long at all (which is unusual for nature photography). Not so lucky for the pike! The result was

"Can't get you out of my head" - which gave Michael the title of Best Overall Image in this years IPF National Nature Competition.

Q: What genre of photography best describes your photography or are you a general interest photographer?

A: I would say general interest, but over the past 5 years I have been mainly taking nature photographs.

Q: Canon or Nikon :-)

A: Canon

Q: Would you recommend joining a camera club? Why? What have you got out of it.

A: Highly. I have got a huge amount out of being a participating member of Celbridge Camera Club. The best way to learn is through doing, and participating in the club's internal competitions was and is a great motivating factor to getting out and taking photographs. Receiving feedback from the judges is also educational even if I don't always agree with it. Then there is the opportunity to see what photographs other members of the club are taking.

Additionally, the advanced members in the club have always been willing to share tips and tricks, to answer questions, to help with printing.

Also, being in the club led me down the road of doing my LIPF and AIPF distinctions. In particular for the AIPF distinction I spent two summers doing macro photography during which time I learnt a great deal.

And I have not yet mentioned the guest speakers!

Q: What is your photographic dream?

A: To capture the perfect (full frame, pin sharp, beautiful light, great composition, all out action) nature image.

Pat Heavin's Unique Photographs of Stanley Kubrick and Ryan O'Neal Featured in the Irish Times

In 1973 Mallow Camera Club member Pat Heavin was living and working in Waterford when film director Stanley Kubrick and a host of well-known actors descended on the area to make the film *Barry Lyndon*. Among the actors was heartthrob Ryan O'Neal who had come to prominence in the film *Love Story* released a few years before.

Pat was a member of Waterford Camera Club at the time and managed to get on set during filming close to his house, even though the set was closed to the press.



During a lull in filming Pat approached Ryan O'Neal and asked if he could take his photograph. The actor agreed and following a chat Pat decided to ask Kubrick if he could take his photograph as well. All through his life Stanley Kubrick, who made many iconic films such as 2001: A Space Odyssey and A Clockwork Orange was notoriously camera shy and very few photographs survive of him.

To Pat's astonishment not only did Kubrick agree to be photographed, but Kubrick took a photograph of Ryan O'Neal and Pat together with Pat's camera.



In the intervening years the photographs remained in Pat's private collection and were only shown to family. However when Pat heard that Ryan O'Neal was coming to Dublin for a special 40th anniversary screening of Barry Lyndon he contacted the festival office requesting them to pass on a copy of the photograph to Ryan O'Neal. The Irish Times heard about the photographs and contacted Pat - hence the article in the paper on Saturday 21 March.

Not only that but Pat and his wife Mary were also invited to the special screening of the film at the Savoy Cinema in Dublin and afterwards met up with Ryan O'Neal and other dignitaries at the post-screening bash where he had a good chat with the actor.


Pat's comments on his meeting with Ryan yesterday "He's still as nice a guy as he was 42 years ago, a true gentleman".
