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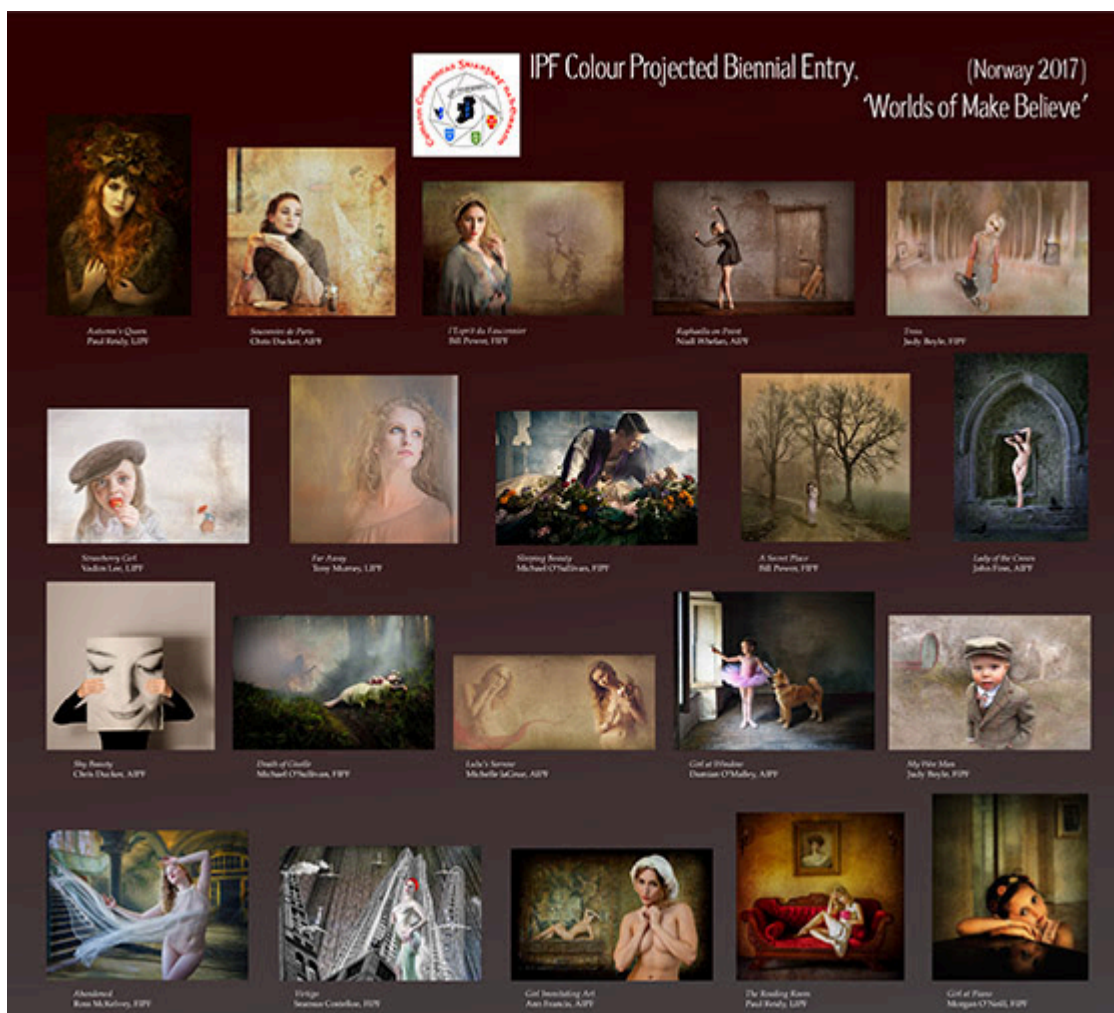

Annual Fees



For those who have already successfully gained an IPF Distinction, did you know that payment is due on an annual basis in order to allow you to use your distinction letters i.e. LIPF, AIPF, FIPF? Without making this annual payment, which is due on the 1st of January each year, you do not have permission to use them. Your annual fee helps the Irish Photographic Federation to continue to expand and to provide a great service for photographers to learn, grow, compete and enjoy socialising with other photographers at events throughout the year. Due to an investment in technology, from 2017 onwards, automated reminder emails will be sent at the start of each year. Please note, regardless of when you pay your renewal fee, our year runs from Jan 1st to December 31st. Those who gained their distinction at the November 2016 sitting are exempt from the 2017 fee.

Focusing on: Rush Library Camera Group



Q: When was Rush Library Camera Group founded?

A: The Rush Library Camera Group was founded in 2010 by two local photographers Derek Balfe and Leo Bissett. Their idea for the group was that it would be more about helping each other and picking up tips from each other, rather than a formal structured club which spent too much time laying down rules.

A number of those original members are still on board in 2017 including Derek and Leo.

Q: How many members do you have?

A: R.L.C.G is a small group of approximately 15-20 members.

Q: When and where do you meet?

A: The group meets fortnightly on a Monday night from 6.45pm to 8pm. We feel very proud to hold our meetings in a beautifully restored Church which is an integral part of our community's history and heritage. Once an Arts Centre, and now a Library. We are situated in the coastal town of Rush in North Co. Dublin. For anyone wishing to come along to the meetings, the Church is situated opposite the Tesco Shopping Centre.

Q: Any notable events (Exhibitions, Workshops)?

A: We constantly strive to improve our photographic knowledge and skills and take great pride in organising a very eventful calendar of activities throughout the year, incorporating practical workshops, lectures, studio nights, demonstrations, photoshoots, outdoor field trips/outings, and weekends away. Our guest speakers to date have included, most recently, Stephanie Daly with her talk on photographing deserted buildings, Des Clinton on his

black and white work, Paul Walsh on Sports photography, Podge Kelly on his work and Michelle La Grue on her journey to achieve AIPF.

The Group is very involved with other photographic activities and events within the community of Rush and have supplied images to the Tidy Towns Calendars, and taken part in the Harbour festival. We had great pleasure in staging our own very successful exhibitions in Rush Library. The exhibitions have depicted all genres of photography enjoyed by our members and we aim to make it an annual event.

In addition we hosted 'An Introduction to Photography' course, which ran for six weeks in a local venue.

Q: Any member have any significant achievements/milestones recently?

A: An Taisce 'Love Your Coast' Photography Awards 2016

Q: To what do you attribute your success?

A: Although a small group, our members have a wide array of skills and knowledge, ranging from the 'eager to learn' novice through to the 'accomplished photographer'. All share a genuine zest and passion for photography. We attribute this varied range of skill mix to the group's success, as the newcomers inject a vigorous appetite for learning and the more accomplished photographer gains great pleasure from sharing his/her knowledge which in turn reflects good teamwork and leadership.

Q: What was the best outing/talk/club night in the last 12 months?

A: The club have travelled to all corners of Ireland since the founding of the group. Antrim and the Causeway back in 2011, followed by Clare, Sligo, Donegal and Cork's Beara Peninsula. Last October 2016 on the Beara was the most memorable of the year, with stunning scenery and fantastic weather! A brilliant house and lot of laughs and of course some processing around the kitchen table.

Q: If another camera club came to your area where are the best kept secrets they could photograph?

A: Rush Harbour, Lambay Island, Ireland's Eye, Rogerstown Estuary, Baldugan Castle, Loughshinny Harbour, Drumanagh Fort and Martello Tower, Kenure

House Portico, Newbridge House, Ardgillen House and Gardens, Skerries and Balbriggan.

Q: What is the aspect of your group that makes it so special?

A: Our Ad hoc spontaneous way of keeping in contact with each other. We use our group “Whatsapp” forum to announce any spur of the moment photography opportunities in the area or arrange a quick get together when weather is good etc. A friendly camaraderie within our group lends itself to very special weekends away - eventful and fun-filled with great craic, good humour and plenty of slagging. Each member’s genuine willingness to commit to volunteering their time when the group organises an event.

We are also very proud to own our own photography equipment - projector, screen, calibrator, etc. which allows us to hold in-house workshops etc.

Q: If you could ask the IPF to improve on one thing what would that be?

A: Communication with small groups in how to build their memberships and a list of good guest speakers.

In the Spotlight: Philip O'Rourke

Philip is a relatively new member of Dublin Camera Club who progressed very quickly to get his AIPF recently. He's already a familiar face at many events such as horse fairs etc.



Q: When did you take up photography?

A: I first took up photography in 2014 when I bought a camera before departing on a 2 month backpacking trip in SE Asia. Unfortunately, despite trying very hard, I was

pretty clueless about my camera and ended up taking thousands of photos that I never look at anymore. On returning to Ireland I spent the summer trying to teach myself how to use my camera, and then in the Autumn I attended the Beginners Course in Dublin Camera Club.

Q: Which club are you a member of?

A: Dublin Camera Club - as I mentioned above I attended the Beginners’

Classes in Autumn 2014 and became a full member once this was over (a great decision I might add)

Q: Do you have any IPF/FIAP/RPS etc. distinctions?

A: Yes - in September 2015 I gained my LIPF for a panel of black and white Street photos taken in Dublin and Lisbon. In March of this year (2017) I gained my AIPF for a black and white panel of photos from horse fairs around Ireland. The seeds of my AIPF panel were sown only weeks after gaining my LIPF, when I attended Ballinasloe in 2015. All going to plan I also expect to receive my AFIAP at the IPF event in Mullingar in May of this year.



Q: First camera? First DSLR?

A: My first camera, my first DSLR and my current camera are all one and the same - the Nikon D3300. A decent entry level camera but it does have its limits. I am waiting to win the lotto to upgrade, until then me and my D3300 will have to trudge along .



Q: What was the background to your most successful image?

A: I guess 'Propping up the Youth' would be my most successful image, winning the O'Shaughnessy Cup for the best Mono print of the Winter League in Dublin Camera Club

in 2016, as well as picking up a couple of Salon awards to date. The image was taken in Drumcondra, around the corner from where I lived at the time. I passed this bus stop several times a day for a week and noticed the new backdrop that had just been put up. It was early May so still quite cold, and I thought to myself that if it starts to rain there could be an interesting picture to be had there. Sure enough walking home on the Friday evening it started to rain and I ran home to grab the camera. When the lady with the umbrella propped herself at the bus stop I was delighted, but had to contend with shooting from across the street - a long lens and a few funny looks later I got the image I hoped for.

Q: Your own favourite image?

A: I have to go with 'Propping up the Youth' - my first image to win me awards from both Dublin Camera Club and from Photographic Salons.

Q: What genre of photography best describes your photography or are you a general interest photographer?

A: I don't know enough about genres to answer this definitively, I would say probably somewhere along the lines of photojournalism or street photography.



Q: Canon or Nikon or Fuji or Sony?

A: Nikon - for now.

Q: Would you recommend joining a camera club? Why? What have you got out of it?

A: Yes, I definitely would recommend joining a club. The club environment is a great place to meet likeminded people, exercise your competitive spirit (if you have one) and most of all to develop as a photographer. I think a willingness to accept critique, to take advice on board and to absorb the knowledge of those around you will really help to maximise your club membership.

Q: What does photography mean to you?

A: Photography is an outlet - something where I can feel like I am creating and achieving something, perhaps I can create a body of work to point to and be proud of some day. It is also something to keep me active and motivated in life, and when I get that moment of capturing a 'great' image it gives me a great sense of satisfaction and happiness.

Q: What is your photographic dream?

A: I am still new to photography and so I am still trying to figure this out. In fact, being honest I haven't really thought about a 'photographic dream' yet - for now I am simply trying to continue to learn and become a better photographer, I still have so much to learn. I am enjoying taking steps along the IPF and FIAP distinction paths and would hope to continue doing so in years to come. I would also love to travel with my camera and to document the way of life in fields afar.
