- When entering the competition, pay careful attention to the definitions of Advanced and Non Advanced entry criteria. Entry into the incorrect category can lead to disqualification.
- A digital copy of ALL entries including prints must be uploaded at the time of online entry.

As with the POTY competition above, please pay particular attention to the following major announcements regarding this competition -

- The closing date for entries (all regions) is December 12th
- The competition is open to all individual photographers who are paid up members of currently affiliated photographic clubs or societies
- Please take note of the mandatory labeling system for all print entries. These labels will be colour coded as per your region and available from IPF website
- When entering the competition, pay careful attention to the definitions of Advanced and Non Advanced entry criteria. Entry into the incorrect category can cause administrative mayhem!
- A digital copy of ALL entries including prints must be uploaded at the time of online entry

The successful administration of this major national process involving several thousand images overall depends on you, the photographer following these very straightforward guidelines. There is a huge voluntary teamwork involved here both from regional rounds through to the final, so let's get it right from the beginning.

The updated rules for this season along with details of this competition and online entry system will be available on November 16th over on the IPF website. Regional qualifying rounds will be held in January. Keep an eye out for details of your region! 



IPF 34th National Audio Visual Championships - Report and Results

Report of the Irish
Photographic Federation's
34th National Audio Visual

Championships held on 15th & 16th October in Aras Chronain Ionad Culturtha,
Clondalkin, by Lilian Webb, AIPF, Event Co-ordinator.



The weekend was a great success. Keith Leedham, FRPS, EFIAP, FIPF judged the 27 sequences over Novice, Intermediate, Advanced & Club categories. There were entrants from Limerick Camera Club, Celbridge Camera Club, Shannon Camera Club, Offshoot Photographic Society, Malahide Camera Club, Palmerstown Camera Club, An Oige Photographic Group & Enniscorthy Camera Club. These were all judged on Saturday, 15th October.

29 people enjoyed a Gala Dinner in Aras Chronain on Saturday night.

The results are below and the winners were presented with their awards on Sunday afternoon with the showing of 8 sequences. We were delighted to have Sheamus O'Donoghue, Shannon Camera Club and entrant as Vice President of the Irish Photographic Federation to present the awards, together with the chain of office.

Richard Brown chairman of the 22nd International Audio Visual Festival of the Royal Photographic Society presented awards to Margaret Finlay, LIPF, Palmerstown Camera Club who received a FIAP Commended ribbon for her sequence "Sweet Afton". He also presented Raymond Hughes, ARPS, AIPF with the RPS SIG Bronze Medal for his "Historical Documentary" "To What End?"

Malcolm Imhoff, FRPS, FACI (M) judged a Leeds/NIPA/IPF AV Showdown with 7 sequences from each. The winning federation was NIPA with James Hamill & Raymond Hughes joint runners up with "What Might Have Been" and "To What End?" respectively and the overall winner was James Hamill with "Mountains Of The Mind". The Irish Photographic Federation sequences and their authors were: Rita Nolan, LIPF with "Journey Of The Soul", "Sweet Afton" by Margaret Finlay, LIPF, "Winter Reflections" & "Stained Images" by Edwin Bailey, LIPF, "Unhurried Time" by Yvonne Acheson, LIPF, "Lost Reflections" by Brendan O'Sullivan, AIPF and Celbridge Camera Club's "St. Bridget's Pastures". A selection were shown on Sunday morning, while all 7 from both NIPA & IPF were shown in Leeds on Friday, 14th October.

East Leinster Audio Visual Group proudly presented their first ever print exhibition in conjunction with the AV National Championships. Rita Nolan organised the exhibition and other exhibitors were Alan Lyons, Bridie Maughan, Brendan O'Sullivan, Christy Doyle, Diarmuid O'Donnchadha, Lilian Webb, Joan O'Callaghan, Eamon O'Murchu, Liam Haines, Marie McGuinness, Margaret Finlay, Pearl Walsh, Dallas Camier and Pat Collins.

IPF Distinctions Service Update

Please see the update below from our Distinctions Secretary.

Prospective applicants for distinctions should note the following:

November 2016

DATE CHANGE: Please note that due to circumstances beyond our control, the November distinction sitting originally scheduled for November 19th will now be held on Saturday November 26th at LIT Thurles.

The assessment quotas for Licentiateship, Associateship and Fellowship are full.

March 2017

The assessment quotas for Licentiateship and Associateship are full. There will be no Fellowships adjudicated at this sitting.

May 2017

The assessment quota for Associateship applications has been reached and is closed. We are currently accepting applications for Licentiateship and Fellowship for the May 2017 sitting. Prospective applicants are reminded that once you book, you must present your panel for adjudication at that session, or if you are not ready, your fee is forfeit and you must reapply for another session.

Remainder of 2017

There will be assessment sessions in May, September and November, at dates and venues to be announced.

Courtesy

Information on future assessment dates will be published in this newsletter and posted on our website. While we are very happy to deal with your queries, please bear in mind that we are

volunteers, and ask that you respect the time we give by first checking for the information you need on our website.

Waiting Lists

The team of assessors engaged for any session is planned well in advance based on the subjects to be presented in Fellowship, Associateship and in many cases Licentiateship applications. Given this, and the added administrative burden to maintain a waiting list, please be advised that there are no waiting lists, no standby lists etc!

Deferrals

Applicants must proceed with the assessment date they applied for and changes of date are no longer allowed. If an applicant does not fulfil the date applied for, the application is regarded as cancelled and the application fee will not be refunded.

All of this means that prospective applicants should give careful consideration to whether or not their panels are at least substantially ready before applying for assessment. If in doubt seek advice from others, particularly those who have been successful in getting distinctions. Better still, go to a distinctions advisory day when one is organised by your Region.

Focusing on: Dublin Camera Club



Q: When was Dublin Camera Club founded?

A: The club started in August 1945 when a group of Dublin photographers felt that the entry conditions of the Photographic Society of Ireland were too high

to attract those starting out in photography, so they decided that there was a need in the city for another camera club.

The inaugural meeting was held on November 5th in the old Jury's Hotel in College Green. The meeting took the form of a monochrome lantern-slide lecture showing photos taken by Harry Braine on a trip through pre-war Holland, Belgium and Germany.

Q: How many members do you have?

A: The Club currently has around 180 members who meet each Tuesday evening at 8pm, year-round, in our premises at 10 Lower Camden Street. The club leases the complete building which comprises of three floors.

- Ground Floor: Gallery and Club meeting room; Two fully-equipped darkrooms.
- First Floor: Council meeting room; Coffee Dock
- Top Floor: Fully equipped Studio; Competition-prints in and out.

Q: Any notable events?

A: The club has a full and varied calendar with year-round activities. These include:

- Beginners' Classes, which are the life-blood of the club. They're probably the best classes in the country and the best value for money in town today.
- The Novice Workshop, regularly boasts in excess of 20 attendees and, for the first time ever in the history of the club, put on its own exhibition earlier this year.
- The Photoshop Workshop, where members pass-on their editing skills.
- Two fully equipped Darkrooms which, believe it or not, are still in demand in this digital age.
- The fully-equipped Studio on the top floor, which has backdrops, lights, soft-boxes, reflectors and remotes is available for booking by any member for non-commercial work.
- One of the most important aspects of the club is the social life. In addition to the regular Tuesday meeting and the workshops, the club organises at least one Outing each month with weekends away at least twice a year.
- The Club is always represented at Peoples' Photography on St. Stephen's Green on the last weekend in August, with up to 20 members show-casing their work.

Q: Any significant achievements or milestones recently?

A: This year, Dublin Camera Club celebrates its 70th anniversary and marks the occasion with the publication of a book entitled: "70th Year Commemorative Book". While this book is not a retrospective of the Dublin Camera Club, it is rather, a collection of current members' photographs, compiled as a compendium to mark our 70th year in the pursuit of photographic excellence, as decided by three independent judges. The images were presented to the judges totally at random, anonymously and ungraded and we are delighted that images from each of the three grades (Novice, Intermediate and Advanced) have made it onto the pages

Q: To what do you attribute your success?

A: The club's continued success is probably due to its members who are encouraged to approach Council (who are identified on the website) with their ideas and criticisms, and, of course, Council's willingness to implement change.

Q: What was the best outing/talk/club night in last 12 months?

A: There isn't one! They've all been good! However, having said that, one of the most important aspects of the club is the social life. In addition to the regular Tuesday meeting and the workshops, the club organises at least one Outing each month with weekends away at least twice a year. This year, members have been to Cuba, Iceland and Bantry, with a trip to Connemara planned for October. Next year's April outing to Northern Ireland is already being planned. Also, the club is always seeking speakers who will demonstrate current trends and techniques.

Q: If another Camera Club came to Dublin where are the best kept secrets that they should photograph?

A: Well, that depends on who you ask! However, if a Camera Club was planning such a trip, we'd be more than willing to assist with the planning and provide the guides.

Q: What is the aspect of your group that makes it so special?

A: The members! These are all "Santa's Little Helpers" - the un-sung heroes in the club who do all the little jobs in the background to keep the club functioning. These include the Gallery volunteers who interface with the public each day the gallery is open and help promote the club and sell its facilities; also those who tirelessly provide their time to do the cleaning and maintenance and fix the "broken" stuff.

And, of course, the Council. These are the behind-the-scenes people who ensure that all the cogs mesh together properly, helping ensure that the club has a full and varied calendar throughout the year. This year's Council is virtually all-new - except Paul Stanley, of course. He's been here forever! But, without his knowledge and support, the council would be impotent.

Q: If you could ask the IPF to improve on one thing, what would that be?

A: Perhaps less emphasis on competitions and more emphasis on workshops, lectures and exhibitions.

In the Spotlight: Seamus Costelloe FIPF ASIFGP

Q: When did you take up photography?

A: In 1980 my interest started in Photography. I was 16 years a keen amateur, now I am a professional/full time photographer, for 16 years. Now my hobby is my profession, and my profession is my hobby.

Q: Which club are you a member of?

A: I am a founder member of Kilkenny Photographic Society, 32 years now in existence.


Q: Do you have any IPF/FIAP/RPS etc. distinctions?

A: I was the first person in the IPF to achieve a Fellowship in Digital

Photography with my panel on wedding photography. I am an Associate of The Society for International Fashion and Glamour Photographers. Represented the IPF in two Celtic challenges in Cornwall & Ireland. Represented Ireland in the FIAP Biennials in World Cup Photography and achieved 3rd place in 2015 and 2nd place in 2016.

Q: First camera? First DSLR?

A: Fuji S1.

Q: What was the background to your most successful image?

A: An image which was taken in Morocco and I knew when I had built a rapport with the subject that pressing the shutter on my camera was going to create a magic moment. I love Environmental Portraiture. I wanted to stamp my style, my vision, my interpretation of environmental portraiture on this image. This image was my challenge to achieve this. It's a much more authentic way to capture your subjects. First of all, you're going to be in an unfamiliar place. That means you'll need to be prepared for all sorts of different lighting conditions. Lighting was my immediate challenge. You never really know until you go there. I was confronted with the challenge, lighting and coping with the language and an audience of curious on lookers etc. Above all, you need to relax and build rapport with your subject. The best asset that any photojournalist has is the ability to build a rapport, the ability to relate to somebody, the ability to talk to somebody and to make them feel comfortable. I needed an ice breaker to initiate the conversation, and then I got permission to take the photograph. Then the Magic happened "the image". It achieved 1st in Black & White at the National IPF Finals in Mullingar 2014, same image won Gold award with the Societies in the UK 2014. If memory serves me correctly it was part of the Celtic Challenge panel also.



Q: Your own favourite image?

A: Photograph of Glenda Gilson on the Front Cover of Irish Wedding Planner Magazine.

Q: What genre of photography best describes your photography or are you a general interest photographer?

A: I love lighting challenges, creating the illusion of 3D from a 2D environment, whether it be fashion, landscape, still life or whatever genre. I love to paint with light. Using a combination of off camera flash and ambient, Maximising whatever situation presents itself. Painting highlight, shadow detail and working the transition lighting, creating form, shape, depth and dimension to my images. Having a "concept" and my light meter are key to whatever I create. Working on location, painting light with ambient and flash, any combination can be the order of the shoot. I have a varied interest in my work as a professional. Portraits, weddings, event photography, corporate and commercial, exhibition work, landscapes and above all I am a print advocate. Fashion, glamour, beauty and art nude studies, are my favourites, and I love the lighting challenges they bring.

Q: Canon or Nikon or Fuji or

Sony?

A: Member of Canon Professional Network.

Q: Would you recommend joining a camera club? Why? What have you got out of it?

A: I would highly recommend joining a camera club. It is a prerequisite if you

want to advance your photography, as a hobbyist, as a keen enthusiast, whether you be amateur or professional, or whatever your status may be. It launched my career in photography. I made the transition from being a keen amateur to a full time photographer. It is now my profession and I love it with a passion. So joining a camera club launched my career. An integral part for me is meeting new friends and maintaining my friendships with members from my past. Going on memorable trips together and sharing new ideas and having fun.

Q: What does photography mean to you?

A: Photography is my life, my passion, and my profession. I love travel and through photography I have been extremely lucky to have had commissioned work abroad. Travel Photography is an integral part of my profession.

Meeting like-minded people from all different backgrounds with a common interest.

Photography has to be the most fulfilling, rewarding and enjoyable options in life.

Q: What is your photographic dream?

A: To be successful in my career as a photographer. It was always my dream to represent my club and country at national and international level. A dream that became reality was to have an Image on any front cover of any magazine. I was very fortunate to have worked for five magazines and all my dreams came through when I got front cover of all issues of these magazines.

Dreams do become reality, through sheer determination and honesty in your work. You will get recognized and persevere in doing so. It has been my dream to make a break through particularly in the world of fashion photography. That became reality when I photographed some of Ireland's leading models. In my portfolio of work I have photographed Miss World, Miss Universe, celebrity photo shoots and even the still photographer on the film set of "Vincent van Gogh - a character study".

I am ambitious and competitive and these traits have helped me achieve my dreams. I have always been driven by having goals and dreams set down and being realistic about achieving them. Always have a strong mind set on that journey to wanting to persevere in doing so.

Very importantly have fun.

I was an International athlete in Long & Triple Jump at schoolboy, junior & senior level for Ireland and fulfilled another dream by making an impression in sports photography when I was awarded International Sports Photographer for 2007 at the Society for Wedding & Portrait Photographers/British Professional Photographers Association in the UK.

It will keep me further inspired & motivated to dream bigger for the future.

Top tips on Architectural Photography with Joe Doyle AIPF AFIAP

This month we bring you another in our very popular series where we ask an expert to share some tips about their area of photography. For the next while, we welcome Joe Doyle from Malahide Camera Club who has been photographing architecture for year and was recently awarded with an Associateship from the IPF for a monochrome panel on same. Thanks Joe! Over to you!



Why Architecture for me?

Not an obvious choice for me as a Waterford man! I didn't own camera until well into my thirties. If I had one growing up, seascapes would have been far easier and more plentiful in Waterford. My interest in architecture started with a movie no less! Back in VHS days, and on my weekend trips back home to Waterford, my brother and I rented the videotape of "Someone To Watch Over Me". Super soundtrack to a underrated classic movie, including the title track with Sting and Roberta Flack, some good acting and stunning cinematography. However, the wonderful Chrysler Building stole the show for me. There was nothing like that in Waterford! I couldn't believe my eyes - it was Art Deco, hypnotic and photogenic! Wow! Years later, a photograph of the Chrysler Building was one of the first Christmas presents in the 90s that my wife Sandra bought for me. I still have an emotional connection to the building.



The Start of Architectural Photography

I started work in Dublin in the mid-80s but most architecture in Dublin wasn't anything to write home about. Worse, I had little or no interest in photography until the mid-noughties. Too busy having the craic! Eventually in the mid-2000s, I was

working 9 to 5, and trying to join Malahide Camera Club and suddenly realised I needed to start taking images. When I looked at the genres, still life, nature and portraiture were bundled as "nice but not for me"! Seascapes and landscape - interesting but thought there was nothing to take in Dublin! Therefore I believed my only option was go to the city centre after work and shoot architecture. This is my first image when I was shocked in a good way and had to remind myself I had taken it. Taken circa June 2008.

Persevering

Like all genres and all activities, practice makes perfect. So off I went to record as many interesting images around Dublin as possible. I am always reminded that some of the best photographers in our club travel less than 3 kilometres for all their images. Make the most of what you have around you!



My take on architectural photography is having an unique perspective on the architecture and also to clearly show what the photographer has brought to the scene. This could be including people or other objects not usually associated with the place. This image was taken of the newly built Aviva Stadium in Lansdowne Road. I particularly liked how the ducks keep sailing away as normal, despite the arrival of this super new stadium and the juxtaposition of them works really well for me.

Cityscapes



The change in Dublin during the Celtic Tiger years had a strong influence on my own photography. Suddenly, those unloved quays and dockland areas were transformed. Brave decisions made on architects and how the city should look. The image below is from 2010. With a Calatrava bridge and cosmopolitan skyline, it was unrecognisable from the old Dublin that I arrived to, in the mid-80s. To be honest, you might be hard pushed to say where it was, save for the distinctive Convention Center.

The pace of change in our cities is staggeringly quick now and I am reassured that photographers will be able to record these changes in cities as they change, renew and blossom. These changes offer great opportunities to photographers as new areas are rejuvenated.

Great projects like the Waterford Walls project of 2015 and 2016 offer new possibilities for photographers to capture changes in cities right in front of them.

Paris - The Start of Something Serious

Valentine's Weekend, 2010 and I find myself in Paris. Went to the France v Ireland rugby game at the Stade de France stadium on the Saturday and the sunrise weather forecast was favourable for the Sunday. However Sunday is Valentine's Day and you're in Paris with your wife? What to do? Obviously, get up very early and quietly and get back before you noticed! Many Cityspaces resemble landscapes and seascapes in that the natural light needs to be complementary and sunrise/sunset are the best times for most cityscapes. These two images were taken at dawn and dusk in Paris that weekend.

Competition Themes for 2016/2017 Season

In case you missed it last month, the themes for the upcoming 2016/2017 competition season are as follows:

Creative/ Experimental Photography

Colour Print Any printed colour image that complies with the general rules of the competition may be submitted under the Creative/Experimental Photography theme. Terms that cover this genre include abstract, altered reality, contemporary, creative, surreal, experimental. Images may be altered, either digitally or otherwise, by the maker, but all elements of the image must have been taken by the entrant (clip art, stock, licensed or copyright free ingredients are not allowed). Photographic content should predominate. The original image content may be changed with adjustments, scenes altered, elements added, removed or replaced. The only limit is your imagination.

Environmental Portraiture

Monochrome Print Any printed monochrome image that complies with the general rules of the competition may be submitted in the Environmental Portraiture category. An environmental portrait is a portrait taken of one or more people in their usual environment, such as their workplace or home, and should, in essence ‘tell a story’ about that person. Travel and street photography may be considered part of this category. Studio portraiture is excluded from this category. Manipulation of images in this category is permitted but must be kept to a minimum.

The Human Face and Body

Projected Image Any projected colour image that complies with the general rules of the competition may be submitted under the Human Face and Body theme. The centre of interest in the image must be the human face and/or body in all its forms and manifestations, including nude and creative compositions. Images in this category may be taken indoors, in studio, or outdoors, and may include more than one person in the image.

Nature - Print

Flora and Fungi

The use of cultivated plants and fungi is not permitted in this category. All images interested must be in the wild.

**Nature -
Projected**

Irish Wildbirds and Wildlife

Images entered in this category must have been taken in any part of the island of Ireland, its islands or seas. Images taken in any other part of the world, including Great Britain (England, Scotland and Wales) are not allowed. Images taken in Northern Ireland are eligible. Life forms such as fish, mammals, reptiles, insects and arachnids may be entered in this category. Captive and domesticated species are not permitted.


Multiple Sclerosis Calendar Competition 2017 - Results

FIAP Distinctions Update

Applications for MFIAP are now being accepted. The latest date for receipt of applications and all submitted material is 21st December. Whilst applications and payment are to be made via the IPF website, any potential applicant should first get in touch with Paul Stanley, FIAP Liaison Officer - via the IPF website.



It is important to note that applicants for MFIAP must hold the EFIAP distinction and must have held it for at least three years. Anyone who has previously applied for MFIAP and who was not successful must wait for at least three years before applying again. An applicant can only apply for the MFIAP a maximum of three times.

Applications for AFIAP, EFIAP and the EFIAP levels distinctions are also now being accepted - with a closing date of 28th February 2017. Please note that closing date for these distinctions was previously listed as January 31st. Apologies for any confusion caused.

Application and payment are to be made via the IPF website - however applicants for these distinctions should also contact Paul Stanley to ensure that they have the most up to date information.



Dublin Camera Club Book Launch



Dublin Camera Club are delighted to announce the launch of Dublin Camera Club's 70th Year Commemorative Book and associated exhibition.

The launch took place on Monday, September 26th at Pearse Street Library, Dublin and was officially launched by IPF President Michael O'Sullivan.

The Club's Commemorative Book, marking the occasion of the club's 70th anniversary features a special juried selection, including over 100 images selected to showcase the highest standard of photography within Dublin Camera Club.

In early 1946 the Dublin Camera Club met in their first premises at 40 Upper Mount Street, which held a lecture room, studio room and an "enlarging room" with a rent of £1 per week. Membership grew and plans commenced for the first members' Annual Exhibition in August 1946, held in early 1947 with the elected president at the time, Harry Braine. Since that time the club has grown and evolved, with the establishment of monthly competitions, outings and the first annual dinner in 1949. In 1951 the premises changed to 60 Lower Baggot Street, which remained the Club's home for 39 years. The end of the 1950's saw Meta Gale (elected Honorary Secretary - a post she held until 1995) and Eddie Chandler become members of the club. Over the decades groups emerged within the club including 'Dawn Patrol' - a weekly early morning Sunday outing around the city and 'a colour photography group who initiated 'Colorama', a national competition of colour slides first held in 1964 with over 1000 entries. The club has had numerous well respected photographers in its midst over the years. Their work and talent continues to inspire current members which can be clearly seen in this wonderful publication Dublin Camera Club - 70th Year Commemorative Book.
