I'm not sure if any of the rest of you, especially the mature adults among you share my sentiments above, but the second I notice the days and evenings drawing short and the earlier onset of a slightly cooler dusk, my thoughts immediately turn to Samhain! I absolutely love that time of year. I have fond memories of Samhain/Halloween as a child, growing up in a community wealthy in superstitious older people. The stories, the food, the hairs standing on the back of my neck as I walked up the street alone in the dark at the end of the night when we all headed back to our respective homes. All memories which are as vivid now as if I was back there. If I close my eyes, I can feel the chill of the late Autumn air on my face, and I can smell that unique blend of cold damp air infused with fruit and coal or peat smoke in a way that was uniquely "Samhain" or "Halloween"!



Things are different now in many ways. The innocence and superstition are largely gone, replaced by a more confident view of the world. As we spend our time worshipping at the altar of Sky Sports, X-factor or Social media epidemics of cats falling off of counter tops, we are so sure of ourselves and that we have it all figured out. But we don't! We only think we do. The superstition might be gone, the thoughts of devils, ghouls and ghosts as real entities might be gone, but underneath the veneer of sophisticated worldly wisdom is something far more innocent. Something more vulnerable. Scratch away at the surface, and inside all of us is an innocent little child who wonders at the world, and is fascinated with the unknown! That's even more true for us as photographers and artists. Why else did we pick up a camera, or a paintbrush in the first place? For me, it's an amazing way to see something, describe it, express one's feelings about it and share it, without ever having to understand it. That's the child in all of us reaching out to the world!

I guess that's why I also love this time of year as a photographer. It's true that Autumn is a visually stunning time of year, and though I love that too, I don't think that's the reason I'm drawn to Autumn as a photographer. The subdued light, the changing colours becoming more muted as the

season progresses, the amazing dramatic skies are all visually stunning, no doubt, but more importantly, they move me. They are evocative. I think I'm drawn to this time of year because it triggers feelings in me. The feelings and nostalgia I mentioned above, and in my opinion the best visual work, the work with the most depth, always begins with a feeling! Because that's when we are truly invested in the image. Whether the subject is a creation of total fantasy, or a technically brilliant record of a natural event, the principle holds. If it moves us, then it moves us to express ourselves better, and it moves those in turn who view the work.

So for me, Autumn into Winter provides the emotional trigger, AND the visual ingredients to get all kinds of images out of my head. But it also gives me the opportunity to record the holiday I hold above all others. An opportunity I miss more years than not, but let's try again this year. Things may have changed since my childhood, but there are still amazing events to be captured. The Shandon festival, with it's legendary parade and dragon, for instance is something I've yet to capture. This could be the year.

"Why are you going on about Halloween already, Michael? It's only September!"

Because from experience, if we don't plan early around important times of year, we invariably miss them as they whizz by! So get planning now to capture the most amazing night of the year! In fact, if you know of any interesting things going on for Samhain/Halloween in your area, why not let us know? We'd love to publish a countrywide diary of Halloween events next month!

Plus, I get to talk about Halloween for two months in a row! That's what makes life worth living!

Speaking of images and emotion; take a look at our spotlight this month. John talks about his most successful image, "The wake of Dani Popan", and what an image it is! It is an example of exactly the kind of emotional investment I was talking about. You can tell me about how technically well captured it is, what a great monochrome it is, what a rich range of tones it has, and though you'd be correct, I couldn't care less! It is a remarkably emotional image. Not just because of the content, relatives mourning over the tragic Dani Popan, but because of how it is communicated to us. It is an emotional moment captured intimately, yet sensitively, and it draws us into the event, making us feel the sadness. It makes me want to never miss a precious moment again.

Planning is well advanced for the 2016 IPF National Shield competition! It will be held in Cork this year on Saturday November 12th, venue to be announced shortly. Following a record entry for the last two years, we are hoping to have even more clubs entering this year!

The Shield is a club competition specifically designed to showcase the work of the non-advanced members of our member clubs. The criteria for non-advanced along with lots of information about this competition can be found over on [our website](#).

We have three excellent judges coming over to assist us;

- Jane Lines MPAGB BPE5* LRPS
- Terry Donnelly FRPS FSWPP MPAGB FBPE EFIAP

In addition, we have two super speakers - Eithne Ni Anluain and Ross McKelvey MPAGB FIPF EFIAP/S FBPE. To help us manage costs, there is a very nominal charge of just €2 per person per lecture.

In terms of times and deadlines, we want to keep this as simple as possible for everyone. Please confirm your club is taking part as soon as possible and provide payment by Paypal by 23rd October at the latest, two weeks ahead of the Shield itself 12th November. Completed entry forms and images must be received by October 30th. The entry fee is €75 whether you are entering one or two panels.

Rules will be published soon on IPF website and we will communicate more details in next month's newsletter.

IPF Photographer of the Year & Nature Photographer of the Year Competitions

Dear fellow photographer,

The time of year has come again when we launch into the new Photographer of the Year season for 2016/2017. Full details of the competitions, including sponsors, fees, updated rules, and entry system will be posted on the IPF website over the coming week.

The format of the competition remains largely unchanged from the process introduced last year, with one important exception (as follows)

Closing Date:

This year we will introduce a single entry system for each competition. There will not be separate entry systems for each region. The new entry system will be open for entries in October and will close on November 15th in the case of the Photographer of the Year, and November 22d for the Nature Photographer of the Year. Please note that the closing dates apply to ALL REGIONS, regardless of the dates chosen for the Regional Qualifying rounds. Regional Qualifying rounds take place as normal otherwise.

As in previous years the Regional Qualifying rounds will be judged between Late November and the End of January (the actual dates to be decided in each region).

Please take note of the new closing dates, and get to work.

Please see the update below from our Distinctions Secretary.

Prospective applicants for distinctions should note the following:

September 2016

The assessment quotas for Licentiate, Associateship and Fellowship are full.

November 2016

The assessment quotas for Licentiate, Associateship and Fellowship are full.

March 2017

The assessment quotas for Licentiate and Associateship are full. There will be no Fellowships adjudicated at this sitting.

Remainder of 2017

There will be assessment sessions in May, September and November, at dates and venues to be announced. Applications for these sessions will be announced in a later Newsletter.

Courtesy

Information on future assessment dates will be published in this newsletter and posted on our website. While we are very happy to deal with your queries, please bear in mind that we are volunteers, and ask that you respect the time we give by first checking for the information you need on our website.

Waiting Lists

The team of assessors engaged for any session is planned well in advance based on the subjects to be presented in Fellowship, Associateship and in many cases Licentiate applications. Given this, and the added administrative burden to maintain a waiting list, please be advised that there are no waiting lists, no standby lists etc!

Deferrals

Applicants must proceed with the assessment date they applied for and changes of date are no longer allowed. If an applicant does not fulfil the date applied for, the application is regarded as cancelled and the application fee will not be refunded.

All of this means that prospective applicants should give careful consideration to whether or not their panels are at least substantially ready before applying for assessment. If in doubt seek advice from others, particularly those who have been successful in getting distinctions. Better still, go to a distinctions advisory day when one is organised by your Region.

Audio Visual Distinctions

The annual IPF Audio Visual distinction sitting takes place on Sunday October 15th at Aras Chronain, Clondalkin as part of the IPF AV Championships Weekend.

Focusing on: Dundalk Photographic Society



Q: When was Dundalk Photographic Society founded?

A: 1979

Q: How many members do you have?

A: The number of members is quite fluid, we were restricted by space up to a couple of years ago so currently 70ish with around 40 to 45 active on a weekly basis

Q: When and where do you meet?

A: We meet every Thursday 8pm to 10pm between September and May in our Club room over Mc Geough's Pub in Roden Place, opposite the Cathedral in Dundalk Town centre.

Q: Any notable events?

A: We hold an annual exhibition of our members' work every year between the end of April and May in which we normally exhibit somewhere between 100 and 110 pieces of work which are selected from across the three sections of Photographers within our club. Next year's exhibition will commence on the 21st of April in the basement of An Táin Art Gallery, Town Hall, Dundalk. We have a workshop planned for February with Rikki O'Neill, and hopefully a workshop with Podge Kelly before 2017. We also normally have two talks/presentations per month from photographers/artists who operate within the Island of Ireland, many of whom will be IPF members.

Q: When was the club started and by whom?

A: The Club morphed into its current form in 1979 and was then called the Dundalk Practical Photography Club headed by the late Sean Casey and a consortium of people some of whom

were James Lavery, Paddy King, Dave Bowen, Michael Mc Bride, followed by Brendan Mulholland who is the longest running member.

Q: Any significant achievements or milestones recently?

A: Finishing 12th in the most recent FIAP world cup and winning a Judge's medal in the same. Achieving 1st place the B division in the Photographic Society of America international interclub competition with several medals and awards and promotion to the A division. Finishing 3rd overall in the IPF National Club Championship with individual medal awarded. One of our longest running current members Arthur Carron (a member from the age of 15) had his solo exhibition titled "Indian street Culture" in the CHQ IFSC, Custom House Quay, Dublin in support of the Hope Foundation and was opened by Miriam O'Callaghan, a fantastic exhibition. Five of our members achieved their LIPF and one their FIPF in the past year. Gabriel O'Shaughnessy was awarded his EFIAP/silver and Tony Mc Donnell was awarded his EFIAP/platinum. Many members continue to win salon medals and awards on a monthly basis. However many members consider winning image of the month in one of our six qualifying in-house competition rounds an achievement, as these images inevitably go forward and win medals and awards nationally and internationally.

Q: To what do you attribute your success?

A: Love of photography, fun attitude, talent, hard work, willingness to learn and sharing of knowledge among the membership, and the competition selectors headed by Denis Whelehan.

Q: What was the best outing/talk/club night in last 12 months?

A: The club organised a day trip (a bus full of members) to Dublin Zoo in the morning time and into the city centre in the afternoon for some street photography. The day proved quite eventful. We also have a good weekend away every year in September.

Q: If another camera club came to Dundalk where are the best kept secrets that they should photograph?

A: Probably Colm Kane's garage, where he shoots most of his still life and develops his wet dark room prints while pondering upon which club images he feels might suit a world cup panel, failing that the County Louth coast line, Cooley mountains and the town of Dundalk itself has several locations which have produced a wealth of images for our membership which have won awards the world over, one location of note would be Clarke train station.

Q: What is the aspect of your group that makes it so special?

A: While we frequently see in the opening lines of club profiles "we are a group of likeminded people" our observations have been that within the membership of Dundalk Photographic Society you could be hard pushed to find even a small nest of likeminded people. What we have is a very diverse group of people spanning a vast demographic with a huge range of backgrounds, but all having one common interest and that is photography. The collective knowledge and experience among our membership is amazing, and when such a group expresses its creativeness something especially good always happens.

Q: If you could ask the IPF to improve on one thing, what would that be?

A: To continue to persist in raising the profile of Irish Photography as an Art both at home and abroad.

In the Spotlight: John Butler FIPF ARPS

Q: When did you take up photography?

A: I have been fascinated by photography since I was a child and I took my first photographs when I was about eighteen and had saved up the money to buy my first camera.

A: What club are you a member of?

A: I was a founder member of Drogheda Photographic Club and re-joined it in 1990 having spent sixteen years living in London. While in London I was a member of Muswell Hill Photographic Society.

Q: Do you have any IPF/FIAP/RPS etc distinctions?

A: I have a Fellowship from the Irish Photographic Federation and an Associateship from the Royal Photographic Society. I am one of the IPF distinction judges and it is really pleasing to see the wonderful successful panels submitted by applicants.

Q: First Camera, first DSLR?

A: My first camera was a Zorki and my first DSLR was a Nikkormat which I still have. The light meter has given up but everything else still works.

Q: What was the background to your most successful image?

A: While in Romania I was invited to the wake of a young man who had been tragically killed in a motor accident the evening before he was due to go to Germany to take up a job. I spoke to his distraught family for some time and took some photos for them. The next day I returned to the house for the funeral and took some more photos. I sent copies of the photos to the family as promised. My photo of The Wake of Dani Popan is one of my most successful and poignant photographs.



Q: Your own favourite image?

A: "The Wake of Dani Popan" and a photo I took in Gori in Georgia of a cobbler whose workshop is decorated with photos of Stalin, who was born in Gori.

Q: What genre of photography best describes your photography or are you a general interest photographer?

A: My main interest is in environmental portraits that tell a story about my subjects and their lives.

Q: Canon, Nikon, Fuji or Sony?

A: I have always used Nikon cameras. An original Nikkor lens from the 1970's still works on my Nikon D3!

Q: Would you recommend joining a camera club? Why? What have you got out of it?

A: I strongly recommend joining a camera club because it gives you the opportunity to view other people's work as well as discussing your own photography and getting advice from fellow club members. Being a club member has not only helped me to improve my photography but to make many good friends over the years.

Q: What does photography mean to you?

A: It has enabled me to capture that critical moment that says something important about my subjects and their environment.

A: What is your photographic dream?

A: My ongoing dream is to get a better picture every time I go out with my camera.



Who's Who on IPF Council

This month we introduce you to Sheamus O'Donoghue from Shannon Camera Club, newly appointed Vice President of the IPF who takes over from Lilian Webb. Sheamus will perform presidential duties when our President Michael O'Sullivan is unavailable.



"I have had an interest in photography since I was very young. An aunt of mine used to come on holidays to our house almost every summer and used to bring her Box Brownie with her. I can still remember looking down into the little basic optical viewfinder and being fascinated by it. I thought I could make my own box camera with wood, and did, having endless enjoyment making imaginary pictures while rolling the backing paper from old 120 or 620 film through it.

I have been a member of Shannon Camera Club since it was founded in 1977, and I am the only one of the original members still in the club. I have served as Chairperson and Secretary at various times over the years. Looking back, hundreds of people have passed through the club and it has always been a privilege to have met with and helped so many with their photography.

Our club has been affiliated to the SACC almost from the beginning and I have served as its Chair some years ago along with other members of our club as Secretary and Treasurer. I have been associated with the IPF in one way or another almost since its foundation and can clearly recall a promotional visit to Limerick C C, to which our club was invited, and meeting with Sean Casey and Des Clinton. The Federation had only been formed at the time. The IPF was a bit of a mystery to us but eventually we joined and the rest is history. I have made many friends through photography and, to me, that is what Clubs, the IPF, the SACC and the Audio Visual group are all about. I see it as a community of friends enjoying a common interest.

I do not specialise in any particular type of photography and would be just as much at ease photographing people as I would out in the landscape. In truth I just love everything to do with photography and the camaraderie that goes with it in the club scene."

IPF Nature Group Workshop

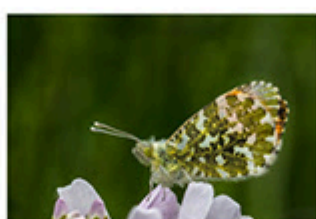

Competition Themes for 2016/2017 Season

In case you missed it last month, the themes for the upcoming 2016/2017 competition season are as follows:

Creative/ Experimental Photography

Colour Print

Any printed colour image that complies with the general rules of the competition may be submitted under the Creative/Experimental Photography theme. Terms that cover this genre include abstract, altered reality, contemporary, creative, surreal, experimental. Images may be altered, either digitally or otherwise, by the maker, but all elements of the image must have been taken by the entrant (clip art, stock, licensed or copyright free ingredients are not allowed). Photographic content should predominate. The original image content may be changed with adjustments, scenes altered, elements added, removed or replaced. The only limit is your imagination.

Environmental Portraiture

Monochrome Print

Any printed monochrome image that complies with the general rules of the competition may be submitted in the Environmental Portraiture category. An environmental portrait is a portrait taken of one or more people in their usual environment, such as their workplace or home, and should, in essence 'tell a story' about that person. Travel and street photography may be considered part of this category. Studio portraiture is excluded from this category. Manipulation of images in this category is permitted but must be kept to a minimum.

The Human Face and Body

Projected Image

Any projected colour image that complies with the general rules of the competition may be submitted under the Human Face and Body theme. The centre of interest in the image must be the human face and/or body in all its forms and manifestations, including nude and creative compositions. Images in this category may be taken indoors, in studio, or outdoors, and may include more than one person in the image.

Flora and Fungi

Nature - Print

The use of cultivated plants and fungi is not permitted in this category. All images interested must be in the wild.

Irish Wildbirds and Wildlife

Nature - Projected

Images entered in this category must have been taken in any part of the island of Ireland, its islands or seas. Images taken in any other part of the world, including Great Britain (England, Scotland and Wales) are not allowed. Images taken in Northern Ireland are eligible. Life forms such as fish, mammals, reptiles, insects and arachnids may be entered in this category. Captive and domesticated species are not permitted.

FIAP Club's World Cup

Entry for the 11th FIAP Club's World Cup is now open. This is the 11th year of this competition, and already on this world stage, an Irish club topped the world back in 2010 with Dundalk Photographic Society and Irish clubs have consistently performed well. So, the question is, will your club be putting an entry in this year?

The competition requires participating clubs to send 20 digital images, with a maximum of two images from any single photographer in the club.


